This book is about the **National Disability Insurance Scheme** or NDIS.



The NDIS gives services and support to people with **permanent disability**.


Permanent disability means a disability that will **not** go away.



The NDIS also gives services and support to people who need **early intervention**.




Early intervention means support for some people before their disability gets too bad.



This book is about a new rule we want to make for the NDIS.



The rule will say what NDIS money can be spent on.



We have made a list of things that NDIS money can be spent on.

Accommodation and tenancy assistance

Accommodation and tenancy means where you live.

Assistance means help.



NDIS money can be spent on things like

• support to find somewhere to live



 support to stay in the place where you live now.

Assistance animals



Assistance animals means animals that are trained to support people with disability.

For example, guide dogs.



NDIS money can be spent on an **accredited** assistance animal.




Accredited means the animal has passed a test to say it is a good assistance animal.




Assistance in coordinating or managing life stages, transitions and supports

Coordinating or managing means to look after.



Life stages and **transitions** mean when things change in your life.



NDIS money can be spent on a support worker to show you how to do things by yourself.



For example, how to

move home



find a job




• go to appointments.

Assistance to access and maintain employment or higher education



Higher education means education you get after you finish high school.



NDIS money can be spent on supports to


- move from high school to higher education
 - for example, university




• find a job



• keep the job you are in now.





Group or shared living arrangement means you live with other people.



NDIS money can be spent on supports that help you do things in your home.

For example, a support worker who can show you how to

care for yourself



cook



• clean your home.




Your support worker can show you how to be as **independent** as possible.

Independent means you have support to make choices about how you live your life.



Assistance with travel and transport

NDIS money can be spent on travel and transport if you





• cannot use public transport.



For example, you can use some of your NDIS money to take a taxi to

• get NDIS supports




• go to school



• go to work.

Assistive equipment for recreation



Assistive equipment means things that help you do something.



Recreation means things you do for fun, like sport.



NDIS money can be spent on special things you need for recreation.




Assistive products for household tasks



Assistive products for household tasks

means special things that help you do jobs like





• cook.



NDIS money can be spent on things you need to do household tasks.

Assistive products for personal care and safety



NDIS money can be spent on things like

special toilet and bathroom products



special clothing and furniture.

Specialist positive behaviour support



Specialist positive behaviour support means people who have special training to help if you


• do things that are **not** safe for you



• do things that are **not** safe for someone else



 do things that make it hard for you to have a good life.



NDIS money can be spent on specialist positive behaviour support.

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Communication and information equipment

Communication and information equipment

means things that can

• help you get information



• help you give information to other people.

For example, a communication board.



NDIS money can be spent on equipment that can help you

• communicate with other people



• get the information you need.



Community nursing care

Community nursing care means you get care in your home.



NDIS money can be spent on community nursing care if you

have a lot of needs

and



 need care from a nurse or support worker who has special training.





Customised means something that is made for just one person.



Prosthetics means body parts made by a human.




Orthotics means equipment that is made to support your body, like your

• arm or leg



• spine.



NDIS money can be spent on customised prosthetics or orthotics.

Daily personal activities



Daily personal activities means things you need to do every day.

For example, have a shower.



NDIS money can be spent to support you to do things you need do every day.



The support can help you be independent.

Development of daily care and life skills



Daily care and life skills means you can be more independent.

NDIS money can be spent to help you learn daily care and life skills.

Disability related health supports



Disability related health supports means supports you need every day for a health problem.

NDIS money can be spent on disability related health supports.




Early intervention supports for early childhood

Early childhood means

• children under 6 with development delays



• children under 9 with disability.



NDIS money can be spent on early childhood intervention supports like

special support workers




• therapy.



Exercise and personal wellbeing

Wellbeing means you are healthy and happy.



NDIS money can be spent on things that keep you healthy and happy.

For example, things that help you exercise.

Group and centre based activities



Centre based means a place where people go to do activities together.

For example, a community centre.



NDIS money can be spent on group and centre based activities.

Hearing equipment



NDIS money can be spent on **some** types of equipment that can help you hear.

High intensity daily personal activities

Daily personal activities means the things you must do every day.



You might need

 a lot of people to help you do the things you must do every day



 special equipment to do the things you must do every day.





NDIS money can be spent on these personal activities.

For example, support from a worker who has special training.



Home modification, design and construction

Home modification, design and construction

means how your home is




changed

planned



• built.



NDIS money can be spent to make it easier to live in your home.

For example, to get equipment that helps you be independent in your home.

Household tasks

NDIS money can be spent on support with things you cannot do because of your disability.



For example

cooking



cleaning



• doing the laundry.

Innovative community participation

Innovative community participation means you get support to do the things you want to do.



For example

• join a singing group



learn to sail.





NDIS money can be spent to take part in innovative community events.



Interpreting and translation

Interpreting and translation means you can get information in a language you understand.



NDIS money can be spent on interpreting and translation services.

Management of funding for supports



Management of funding for supports means someone looks after your NDIS money for you.



NDIS money can be spent on a plan manager.

A plan manager looks after your NDIS plan for you.



A plan manager can

• find supports for you



• pay the people who give you services



• improve your plan skills.

Participation in community, social and civic activities



NDIS money can be spent on support to take part in activities.

Personal mobility equipment

NDIS money can be spent on personal mobility equipment.



For example, a walker.



Specialist disability accommodation

Specialist disability accommodation or SDA means homes for people with a lot of needs





NDIS money can be spent on SDA.

Specialised driver training



Specialised driver training means

• you learn to use special equipment to drive





NDIS money can be spent on specialised driver training.

Specialised hearing services



Specialised hearing services are hearing services for people who have a lot of needs.

NDIS money can be spent on specialised hearing services.

Specialised supported employment



Specialised supported employment means

help to get a job if

you have a lot of needs

and



 you need a lot of support when you are at work.

NDIS money can be spent on specialised supported employment.

Specialised support coordination



Specialised support coordination means you get extra help to access NDIS supports.

NDIS money can be spent on specialised support coordination.

Therapeutic supports



Therapeutic supports help people to

speak



get around



• be independent.




NDIS money can be spent on therapeutic supports.

Vehicle Modifications




Vehicle modifications are when you make changes to your car.

For example, changes that help you to drive.



NDIS money can be spent on vehicle modifications.

Vision equipment




NDIS money can be spent on **vision equipment**.

Vision equipment means things that can help you see or read.



For example

braille



• a magnifying glass.

A magnifying glass makes things look bigger.
